## Let's talk about climate migration

## A space where climate change and social justice issues collide

Climate migrants, a subset of migrants not yet formally recognised as refugees, are people who have been forced to flee due to sudden or gradual alterations in the natural environment that makes their homelands uninhabitable.

The most common reasons climate migrants seek refuge in other countries are:

Sea-level rise
Extreme weather events
Drought and water scarcity



## STAND STUDENT FESTIVAL 2020

The STAND Student Festival was an online awareness raising activity that took place in October 2020 in order to raise awareness on the combined issues of climate change and migration.



## x 1 virtual exhibition

Working collaboratively with students across the country, artists and those who have first-hand experience with climate-related migration, STAND created a virtual exhibition of art, photography, video and poetry to highlight the effects our changing climate has on vulnerable communities around the world.

As part of this year's festival, we wanted to create an exhibition which challenged people to realise the impact climate change has on migration; why communities are forced to leave their lives behind in search of safety.

## x 1 petition

In order to raise further awareness on the issue of climate enforced migration and to bring an action element into the festival programme, we set up an online petition up that asked the European Union to put better protections in place for climate migrants within the EU.

There is certainly work to be done in terms of engaging more young men with our festival, and we'll make that a key focus in planning for 2021.






## **EVENT ATTENDEES**



## THE STAND FEST PETITION


As an action component to the festival, we created an online petition on the change.org platform that asked the European Union to avert, minimise and address the displacement of people who have been affected by the impacts of climate change




